Fr Harry Writes...

Dear friends,

This week the news has been dominated by the report of the International Committee on Climate Change. It is grim reading. If the world does not reduce its carbon emissions drastically by 2050 we shall face disaster. Droughts and therefore bushfires will become more frequent. The Great Barrier Reef and many other coral reefs will die completely. South East Australia can expect temperatures of 50 degrees. Sea levels will rise as the Arctic and Antarctic icecaps melt. Some Pacific islands will disappear under the ocean and the people who live on them will become refugees. Great rivers on which many people depend for water and irrigation will dry up as the mountain glaciers melt. There will be many more cyclones and hurricanes. There will be wars and conflicts as people fight over declining food and water supplies. Is this the world we want to leave for our grandchildren? We know we can phase out coal and switch to renewable energy. Yet our government has no energy policy. We should be afraid and angry and with state and federal elections coming up we should maintain our rage. Our reading from the book of Job reminds us that this world, the wonderful creation which we take for granted is where we see God at work. God made it. God knows how it works and where it is vulnerable. It is God's home which God shares with us. He gives it to us to enjoy and to care for. It sustains our life but only so long as we respect it and know it as a holy place where we meet the Holy God.

First Reading: Job 38.1-18

Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind: 'Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge? Gird up your loins like a man, I will question you, and you shall declare to me. Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell me, if you have understanding. Who determined its measurements — surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? On what were its bases sunk, or who laid its cornerstone when the morning stars sang together and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy? 'Or who shut in the sea with doors when it burst out from the womb? — when I made the clouds its garment, and thick darkness its swaddling band, and prescribed bounds for it, and set bars and doors, and said, "Thus far shall you come, and no farther, and here shall your proud waves be stopped"? 'Have you commanded the morning since your days began, and caused the dawn to know its place, so that it might take hold of the skirts of the earth, and the wicked be shaken out of it? Have you entered into the springs of the sea, or walked in the recesses of the deep? Have the gates of death been revealed to you, or have you seen the gates of deep darkness? Have you comprehended the expanse of the earth? Declare, if you know all this.

Second Reading: Hebrews 4.12-16

Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account. Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in

every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark, Chapter 10, beginning at verse 17.

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, 'Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: "You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honour your father and mother." ' He said to him, 'Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth.' Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions. Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, 'How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!' And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.' They were greatly astounded and said to one another, 'Then who can be saved?' Jesus looked at them and said, 'For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible.' Peter began to say to him, 'Look, we have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first.'
